



# Station Information

Dagwaagani-mawindoosijigewin – Fall Harvest

<b>Treaty Knowledge</b>	Participants will engage in meaningful dialogue about Treaty #3 and what it means to all people within the territory, to clear-up common misunderstandings and provide a deep understanding.
<b>Fish Preparation</b>	While learning about the anatomy of the fish, participants will see how to fillet fish and may even get to try it themselves. Participants will be given a piece of prepared fish.
<b>Geese &amp; Bear Grease</b>	Participants will pluck geese as they learn about the importance of this bird to the Anishinaabe. The plucked birds will be made into sausage at a later date. Participants will also learn how fat from a bear is used as medicine.
<b>Bannock Making</b>	Participants will watch and learn how the Anishinaabe traditionally made bannock.
<b>Wild Rice Parching</b>	Wild rice will be roasted at this station. Participants will help ensure the rice doesn't burn.
<b>Wild Rice Dancing</b>	Boys/men will dance on the wild rice to break the husks from the rice before it is winnowed.
<b>Wild Rice Winnowing</b>	Participants will be given a demonstration on the technique of winnowing and will then begin to winnow. This is an important step in separating the husks from the rice.
<b>Wild Rice Finishing</b>	Students learn the importance of wild rice while cleaning the remaining husks that have not come off the rice in the dancing and winnowing stages.
<b>Grandfather drum</b>	Participants will have an opportunity to learn about Seven Generations Education Institute's Grandfather Drum, Saagajiwe. There will be an opportunity to ask questions.
<b>Deer Preparation</b>	Students will learn about the processing of animals, such as deer when it has been harvested.
<b>Traditional Medicines</b>	Students will have the opportunity to learn about a variety of traditional medicines harvested and utilized by the Anishinaabeg.
<b>Anishinaabemowin Teepee</b>	Students will have the opportunity to learn language with SGEI Anishinaabemowin Revitalization Program students. Language is the heart of the culture.
<b>Honour our Children</b>	Participants will have an opportunity to hear a Residential School Survivor speak about his/her experience in the IRS system.
<b>Métis Games</b>	Participants will learn and play a number of traditional Métis games.
<b>Bannock on a Stick</b>	Students will be able make and bake their own bannock and enjoy a bannock snack at this station.
